

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Two men cut wood all day long. One worked straight through, without stopping to rest. At the end of the day he had a sizable pile of logs. The other would chop 50 minutes and then take a ten-minute break. At the end of the day he had a much larger pile.

"How could you chop more?" asked the man who'd worked continuously. His friend replied, "When I stopped for rest, I also sharpened my ax."

This story from Reader's Digest tells a terrific truth: Time out, wisely spent, is not time wasted.

That is the purpose for the Sabbath Day. God wants you to take time out, and to spend it wisely "sharpening your ax" with his word, worship, prayer, and sacraments. As Psalm 84:4 says, "Blessed are those who dwell in your house."

Like the man who gained by taking time out to sharpen his ax, God promises that you will be blessed by the time you take out to dwell in his holy house.

- ✘ Are you wearied by the burdens of life? Jesus says, "Come unto Me, all ye that are weary and heavy-laden, and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28).
- ✘ Are you uncertain about your life's direction and purpose, not sure if you are going the right way? Jesus says, "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life" (John 14:6).
- ✘ Are you troubled and distressed with problems and perplexities? Jesus says, "Do not let your hearts be troubled; trust in God, trust also in Me" (John 14:1).

✘ Do you feel insufficient for the tasks laid upon you? Jesus says, "Remain in Me, and I will remain in you. No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear fruit unless you remain in Me. I am the Vine; you are the branches. If a man remains in Me and I in him, he will bear much fruit. Apart from Me you can do nothing" (John 15:4-5).

✘ Do you need reassurance of God's love for you, his mercy and forgiveness, his promise of eternal life? Jesus says, "My sheep listen to My voice. I know them; they follow Me; I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish. No one can snatch them out of my hand" (John 10:27-28).

Take time out on the Sabbath Day. Spend it wisely listening to your Master's voice. Whatever your personal needs and problems, it will help to go unto the house of the Lord, there to "sharpen your ax" for daily living.

Recently, parishioners from Touim, including Sunday school members, held their first program in this orphanage.

Before this, there was only humanitarian aid: the church brought them groceries, drinking glasses, and pens for school.

The regional administration let us use its car and bus especially for this trip. Everyone was excited. For many of them it was the first outing like this, the first declaration of their faith in front of many people. Teachers of the orphanage gathered all the children in a big hall. Everyone was interested in our songs accompanied by flute. The organizers of the program tried to make every song unusual. The light was turned off during one of the songs.

The listeners actively participated in the program when they had the oppor-

tunity: they played games, and also enjoyed learning a new song. The orphanage employees liked the concert and asked us to come more often.



Twelve year-old Sveta was one of the Lutheran Sunday School children in Siberia who shared their faith at a nearby orphanage.

Here is an interview with Sveta, one of the Lutheran children from our Sunday School who helped lead the program. She is twelve years old.

Question: Sveta, what did you like about this trip?

Sveta: There are good teachers and the children were listening carefully.

Q: Is this the first outing with a Christian program for you?

S: Yes

Q: What kinds of things did you participate in? Who else was with you on this

trip?

S: I sang. My friends from Sunday School sang with me.

Q: Was it hard to prepare the program?

S: It was not as hard as it was scary to appear. When we arrived at the orphanage and got out of the bus, so many children gathered around us!

Q: What do you remember most of all?

S: When I got caught on something during the play and at the same time I tried to turn around; I could hardly stand up. That would have been terrible if I had

Digging Up the Bible



A series of articles on archaeological discoveries relating to the Bible.

When King Nebuchadnezzar of Babylon laid siege to Jerusalem for the first time in 597 B.C., King Jehoiachin of Judah was taken captive to Babylon (2 Kings 24:10-12). The second siege and destruction of Jerusalem by the Babylonians came a decade later, in 586 B.C. (2 Kings 25:1ff).

The Bible reports that 37 years after being taken into exile, the deposed King Jehoiachin was released from prison and treated favorably by a new Babylonian king: "In the thirty-seventh year of the exile of Jehoiachin king of Judah, in the year Evil-Merodach became king of Babylon, he released Jehoiachin from prison on the twenty-seventh day of the twelfth month. He spoke kindly to him and gave him a seat of honor higher than those of the other kings who were with him in Babylon. So Jehoiachin put aside his prison clothes and for the rest of his life ate regularly at the king's table. Day by day the king gave Jehoiachin a regular allowance as long as he lived" (2 Kings 25:27-30 NIV).

Excavations of Babylon, the Babylonian capital city located in modern Iraq, were begun by German archaeologists in 1855. Probably the most famous find of these excavations was the monumental Ishtar Gate, which was taken to a Berlin museum and reassembled.

But, from the standpoint of Biblical history, a much more significant find were some broken pieces of clay tablets, unearthed in the bottom of a basement stairwell in a building near this gate, where they had fallen when the upper floors collapsed. With the precision of a modern accountant, these tablets meticulously list rations of oil,

barley, etc. paid from this royal storehouse. Included in the list of those receiving rations is "Yaukin, king of the land of Judah," using a spelling for Jehoiachin also found in ancient Israel on seals impressed in clay pottery.

This is one of the most stunning confirmations of the Bible from archaeology. These tablets were badly broken up and deteriorated, and the odds of this particular entry being preserved are unfathomable!

When I Grow Up

Children can often be overheard telling each other what they want to be when they grow up. Perhaps you have even heard, *When I grow up I want to be just like my day or I want to be like mommy.* A warm feeling momentarily floods over you when you hear these precious words from your own child. Next you think: *me*, an example, a role

model for my child? Whoa! I know I'm far from perfect.

What an awesome responsibility it is to be a parent. Children are marvelous imitators. What am I teaching by my example? Do I take time to do spiritual things with them? How do I *show* and not just *tell* about God's love? These were questions I had as we were raising our family.

Begin with prayer. First of all, ask God for wisdom and guidance. Teach your child to pray. *Now I lay me down to sleep... and Come, Lord Jesus, be our Guest...* are the most common prayers taught from infancy. As your child grows, pray for those special concerns in life: Jesus to be with Grandma who is sick, help me not to be afraid during a thunderstorm, keep our family safe on vacation.



Go to church. Don't wait until your child has gotten to the *right age* to take along. Beginning with baptism into God's family, a child begins to learn about Jesus by regularly going to church with mom and dad. Then the day arrives to start Sunday School. Jesus said, *Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these. I tell you the truth, anyone who will not receive the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it* (Luke 18:16-17 NIV).

Take time for family devotions. Devotion books are available for all ages. Children often enjoy taking turns reading. Let them see you do your own personal devotions. This can be a valuable example for them to follow and make a natural part of their daily routine.

Make time for special things. If severe weather keeps you home or church is cancelled, have your own service at home. Involve everyone in some way as setting up an altar, lighting some candles, reading the Bible, playing the piano as everyone else joins in singing. Spend an afternoon or evening together popping popcorn and playing games.

Find ways to help others. A child can learn about serving God by doing something for someone else. Picking up toys and putting them away, emptying the dishwasher or setting the table

Deporting a Woman to Torture?

"Nancy," the woman in this tragic situation, is a member of a congregation in Canada in fellowship with The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. Please pray that she will be spared the impending deportation and almost certain persecution on account of her faith. This story is adapted from an article by Uwe Siemon-Netto, Religion Editor for United Press International.

Has Canada indirectly condemned an Iranian woman to be persecuted, tortured or even killed because of her conversion from Islam to Christianity? The Canadian authorities ordering her to be deported back to her homeland on April 24, 2003 do not believe this will happen in Iran, even though the U.S. State Department declared last year: "The (Iranian) government does not ensure the right of citizens to change or renounce their religious faith. Apostasy, specifically conversion from Islam, can be punishable by death."

"Nancy," an upper-middle-class Iranian and a nurse, became interested in Christianity through contact with a Christian friend while still in Iran. Her

contacts with Christians were found out. She was attacked and now literally bears the scars of her faith, according to Rev. Harold Ristau, her current pastor, a Lutheran.

She managed to flee Iran for Canada in 2000 and soon found herself in the bizarre situation of having to convince a Canadian immigration judge that she was indeed properly baptized and not just pretending to be a Christian in order to gain immigrant status. The judge wished to know, was Nancy duly baptized with water and in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit? The pastor who administered this sacrament e-mailed Ristau that he had indeed used the "Trinitarian formula" and water. But, the judge remained dubious of the sincerity of Nancy's conversion—and seemingly even the legitimacy of the Lutheran faith—and denied her asylum in Canada, even though Nancy's knowledge of the Christian faith was very impressive, according to John Stephenson, a Canadian Lutheran seminary professor who met her.

However, even if the Canadian government suspects Nancy is a fraud, it does not have sufficient proof and under Canadian law the legal principle should be, when in doubt, to rule in her favor. So, what's going on here? Why would Canada not let a much-needed nurse stay? "It totally baffles me," said Gloria Nafziger, a ranking official of Amnesty International in Toronto.

So, it seems that on April 24 Nancy will fly toward possible persecution, perhaps torture, or even worse, as an "apostate" in the Islamic Republic of Iran. Paul Marshall, senior fellow at the Center for Religious Freedom in Washington, D.C. and a leading expert on religious persecution, notes ominously, "Iran has the death penalty for apostasy from Islam. Whether in this case it will carry it out or not we don't know."
