



The theme for our Lent and Holy Week services this year is "Symbols of Our Savior," looking at symbols that Christians use to represent the life and work of Jesus Christ. This was Pastor Vogts' mediation for the final Lent service on April 5. We will conclude this series with meditations on "The Pelican in Her Piety" on Maundy Thursday and "The Crown of Thorns" on Good Friday.



Butterfly

One of the most interesting "Symbols of Our Savior" is the butterfly. We usually think of the butterfly as a symbol of Easter and the resurrection, but the butterfly is also an ancient symbol not only for the resurrection of Christ but also for his suffering and death.

Psalm 22 is often called the "Passion Psalm" because it prophesies in amazing detail the final hours of our Lord's earthly life, his suffering and death on the cross. Psalm 22:6 prophesies about our Lord: "I am a worm and not a man, scorned by men and despised by the people." It was actually based on this verse that the butterfly was adopted by the early Christians as a symbol for our Lord. They believed that Christ's description of himself as a "worm" in this psalm means more than that he will despised and rejected, like a lowly worm. The early Christians also believed that Christ's description of himself as a "worm" in this psalm is a parallel to the life cycle of a caterpillar.

The chrysalis which the caterpillar wraps itself in is like the strips of linen in which Christ was wrapped in the tomb. Just as a caterpillar enters the tomblike chrysalis as a worm and emerges in the form of a beautiful butterfly, when Christ says of himself, "I am a worm and not a man, scorned by men and despised by the people," it is actually a prophecy that following his rejection, suffering and death, he will rise again in a glorified body, like a caterpillar emerging as a butterfly.

In old cemeteries you will often see the butterfly as a symbol on tombstones. Just as Jesus entered the tomb on Good Friday, one day your body will be placed in the grave, like a worm in the ground. But, in 1 Corinthians 6:14 Paul tells us the Good News: "By his power God raised the Lord from the dead, and he will raise us also." By his suffering and death Jesus paid for your sins and earned you eternal life, and just as after his suffering and death he rose from the dead, he promises you also will rise to eternal life with him in heaven. Paul says in Philippians 3:21 that Jesus "will transform our lowly bodies so that they will be like his glorious body." Like the caterpillar which enters the chrysalis as a worm but emerges as a butterfly, your

dead body will rise from the grave and be glorified for eternal life.




Phoenix

Like the butterfly, the phoenix is not only an Easter symbol of our Lord's resurrection, but also a Lenten symbol of our Lord's suffering and death. The mythological symbol of the phoenix goes back long before Christianity. In ancient mythology, the legendary phoenix was a single bird and there existed no other like it. It was said to be the only animal in the Garden of Eden that refused to eat the forbidden fruit after the fall into sin. The phoenix was therefore sinless and perfect and so it would live forever. Every several centuries the legendary phoenix would renew itself. It is interesting that all the different cultures around the world said that it was to the area of the Holy Land that the phoenix would fly and in a tree build itself a nest which it would then set afire and die. Three days later the phoenix would rise again to new life.

The early Christians saw many parallels between the legend of the phoenix and Jesus Christ. Like the phoenix, Jesus was unique and no other existed like him. He too is totally sinless and lives eternally. Like the phoenix flying to the Holy Land to die upon a tree and rise again, it was to the Holy Land that Jesus came down to earth to die upon the cross and rise to eternal life. Jesus put it this way: "I lay down my life—only to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down and power to take it up again" (John 10:15-18). Like the legendary phoenix,

Jesus laid down his life for you only to take it up again to bring you eternal life.

There is another parallel between the phoenix and Jesus Christ. The phoenix was considered to be heavenly food, that if you would eat of it would bring you eternal life. Jesus says of himself: "I am the living bread that came down from heaven. If anyone eats of this bread, he will live forever. This bread is my flesh, which I will give for the life of the world" (John 6:51).



Peacock

Following his suffering, death and resurrection, our Lord's body rested in the tomb from Good Friday through Easter Sunday. Psalm 16:10 quotes the Messiah as saying, "My body also will rest secure, for you will not abandon me to the grave, nor will you let your Holy One see decay."

Based on this prophecy, "you will not let your Holy One see decay," the peacock was adopted by the early Christians as a symbol of our Lord's rest in the tomb. Because, in ancient times it was thought that the flesh of the peacock would never decay. That is why the peacock is a common symbol often appearing in Medieval and

Renaissance art—a peacock on the roof of the stable at Christ's birth, or incongruously strutting near the cross at his crucifixion, or atop the empty tomb on Easter—to symbolize our Lord's promise of resurrection and eternal life.

St. Paul says in Romans 8:11, "he who raised Christ from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies." Our bodies will decay, but the Lord will raise them up and restore them to life. Job 19:25-27 puts it this way: "I know that my Redeemer lives, and that in the end he will stand upon the earth. And after my skin has been destroyed, yet in my flesh I will see God."

The idea that the flesh of the peacock never decays is, of course, mythological. But, there is another, real-life aspect of the peacock that beautifully symbolizes Christ. Although peacocks are very beautiful and seemingly delicate creatures, you may not know that they are actually powerful, fierce fighters, with sharp, crushing claws, like those of a hawk or eagle. In many parts of the world where snakes are prevalent, peacocks are kept by families because they are known as destroyers of snakes.

They protect the family by patrolling the area around their home and crushing any snakes that come close.

In the first promise of the Messiah in Genesis 3:15, the Lord proclaimed to Satan, in the form of a snake, "he will crush your head." Christ's suffering and death on the cross was not a crushing defeat for him, but a crushing defeat for Satan. For, like the peacock crushing snakes with its powerful claws, through his suffering, death and resurrection Christ spiritually crushed and destroyed the serpent Satan.



Pomegranate

Although the pomegranate is virtually unknown in the United States, in other parts of the world it is one of the most popular fruits. Pomegranates were

introduced into the southern United States in the 1800's and grew here very well, but they never caught on. It is just within the last few years that pomegranates have become available in our stores.

If you've never eaten one, the unusual feature of the pomegranate is that it is composed almost entirely of seeds. The outer skin is like a pocket filled hundreds of edible seeds. Jesus once told a parable about his suffering and death: "I tell you the truth, unless a kernel of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains only a single seed. But if it dies, it produces many seeds" (John 12:24).

It was based on this verse that the pomegranate was adopted by the early Christians as a symbol for Christ's death and resurrection. When Christ's body was placed in the tomb, it was like a mighty seed planted in the ground. His suffering, death and resurrection gave birth to billions of Christian faithful, including you. Paul says in 2 Corinthians 4:14, "We know that the one who raised the Lord Jesus from the dead will also raise us with Jesus." The unopened pomegranate is like the closed tomb in which the seed of Christ's crucified body was planted; the opened pomegranate is like the stone being rolled back from the tomb on Easter morn, showing forth Christ's resurrection, which also assures your own resurrection from the dead.

There is another reason the pomegranate is a symbol for eternal life. Tradition says that the fruit on the Tree of Life in the Garden of Eden was the pomegranate, and so throughout the ancient world it was believed that pomegranates were a miracle food, which would bring extraordinary health, slow aging, and even bring eternal life. The ancients used pomegranates and pomegranate juice as medicines for all sorts of illnesses.

The interesting thing is, modern medical science has shown that pomegranates do indeed have many valuable medicinal properties, and pomegranate based foods and drinks are the latest health food craze. There

was a recent article in *The New York Times Magazine* which began:

"As sales pitches go, 'Cheat Death' is a pretty aggressive one. Probably you're skeptical that any product can deliver on such a promise. . . [But] the makes of Pom Wonderful, a drink made from pomegranates . . . supported by . . . real, peer-reviewed research . . . assert that the stuff 'can help prevent aging, heart disease, stroke, Alzheimer's, even cancer' . . ." The article said that even though the slogan should probably "Delay Death" rather than "Cheat Death, "when the company makes big claims for . . . pomegranates, it is quite serious." ("A Fruit's Stand: A Maker of Pomegranate Juice Promises to Save Your Life," *The New York Times Magazine*, April 2, 2006, p. 22)

In Revelation 2:7, Jesus promises to all who trust in him: "I will give you the right to eat from the tree of life, which is in the paradise of God." Christ actually does what the pomegranate only symbolizes. Through faith in him you won't just "Delay Death," but, you really will "Cheat Death" as you live forever with him in paradise.

We Believe: A Study of the Augsburg Confession

For our new Adult Bible Class, on Sundays at 10:30am beginning April 23, we will be looking at the Augsburg Confession of the Lutheran Church. Largely written by a layman, Philip Melancthon, it was also submitted by a group of laymen, rulers of the German states, to Emperor Charles V in 1530 as their official statement of the Lutheran faith.

For our Adult Bible Class it will serve as an excellent discussion guide as we look at what the Scripture says on a number of key doctrines, such as the Trinity, Original Sin, etc. It also touches on controversial issues still pertinent today, such as forbidding priests to marry, and why Lutherans do not require this of our clergy.

The Augsburg Confession is among the official statements of the teachings of the Lutheran Church still officially subscribed to by most Lutheran bodies and congregations, including our own. Come on Sundays at 10:3am to learn more about what your church believes and teaches!



Internet Resources

There is much on the Internet of questionable or negative value. However, there are also many blessings to be found. Last month we listed some excellent resources on the Internet provided by our own Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, including radio station KFUE at www.kfuo.org; the best religious talk radio show in the nation, www.issuesetc.org; and daily chapel from Concordia Theological Seminary, Ft. Wayne, www.ctsfw.edu/chapel/audio.php.

This month we suggest some inspirational offerings from the BBC. Of course, these British programs follow the doctrines of the Anglican Church, which is now very liberal in many areas, and so must be recommended with that significant reservation. However, much of their historic worship, liturgy, hymns, etc. are very similar to ours, their musical quality is absolutely unmatched, and when they simply follow the “old time religion” of their Book of Common Prayer and hymnals, the doctrinal concerns are minimized and these programs can be enjoyed with discernment.

Unfortunately, these BBC programs cannot be downloaded, but must be listened to online. Each week’s program is archived for only one week and then replaced with the latest program.

Since 1926 the BBC has broadcast a weekly “Choral Evensong” service from churches, chapels and cathedrals around Great Britain. The liturgy and hymns are very similar to our Lutheran

Church. The music is of the highest quality. Though the doctrine represented cannot always be endorsed, generally there is no sermon, which minimizes this concern, with the inspiring service consisting only of hymns, readings, traditional prayers and liturgy. Most uplifting is the particularly beautiful chanting of psalms in the Anglican tradition.



Medical Missionary Fights Malnutrition

"My heart breaks sometimes when I think of these little ones who live so marginally; and I trust our loving God to make a way for them."

Those are the words of Dr. Kristen Schmaltz, who treats her patients with great skill, tender care, and lots of prayer too. Since 2002, Schmaltz has served as a career medical missionary in Guinea, West Africa, near the city of Kissidougou. She works with the nutrition and pediatric units of the local hospital and teaches nutrition in villages and refugee camps. In 2004 she received a grant from LCMS World Relief and Human Care to develop a nutrition unit at her Kissidougou hospital. The *Centre Nutrition Therapeutique* or CNT provides intensive nutritional treatment for malnourished children.

Saa Vieux was just such a child. Since losing his parents early in life he has lived in a large extended family. His fourteen-year-old aunt Delphine looks after him, although during the day she must leave him in the care of the family group while she works full time in a sewing shop. When he came to the CNT, he was dangerously malnourished.

For nearly two months, Saa Vieux received round-the-clock feeding care to bring him gradually back to health. When Dr. Schmaltz shared her birthday cake with the staff and patients of the CNT, Saa Vieux was still too frail to enjoy a piece. But, just a month later, Schmaltz says he was "chowing down on porridge."

Dr. Schmaltz continued to pray for Saa Vieux after he returned home. "Though I pray for all our families in CNT, he has a special place in my heart," she relates. As it happened, he contracted malaria back at home, and his family, fearing the cost of treatment, were reluctant to take him to a hospital. One of the CNT workers was able to prevail upon them to allow her to bring him in. "Maybe," says Schmaltz, "that was why God put him in my prayers so often." Dr. Schmaltz works with 140 Lutheran churches and preaching points in Guinea's Forest Region to provide holistic care to all Guineans they touch—Christian and non-Christian—in medical ministry. Not surprisingly, Dr. Schmaltz encourages us to join her in prayer. "Pray that God will use this medical ministry to show love, care, and healing as a witness to Jesus Christ's love and healing as our Savior to all the sick, starving, and malnourished we serve in His name."
