## Are God and Allah the Same?

Our summer Adult Bible Class on "Understanding Islam" included a fascinating video featuring Drs. Ergun and Emir Caner. They came to the United States in 1978 as committed Muslims, with their father under instructions from the Avatollah Khomeini to build mosques here. However, as teenagers they converted to Christianity and are now both prominent Christian theologians with doctorates in theology. Dr. Ergun Caner is president of Liberty Baptist Theological Seminary and Dr. Emir Caner is president of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. This article on the question of whether Christians and Muslims worship the same God is adapted from Dr. Emir Caner (www.emircaner.com/ wordpress).

In some far-flung field around the world a Christian missionary enters a territory which has remained hostile to the Gospel for some time. Upon entering the mountainous village, he is able to speak to some of the villagers about eternal matters. They are uninhibited to

speak about their faith, although reticent to accept any other opinion, and this missionary quickly gains a cursory understanding of their god. He is an allpowerful being who blesses both the just and the unjust. He reveals himself through miracles. Additionally, these villagers believe that there is no forgiveness of sin without the shedding of blood. In fact, these villagers believe that their god has a son and that this son was once dead and now has come to life! Now, can this missionary then assume that the god the villagers are describing, due to so many similar characteristics, is the same God the Scripture reveals?



The Holy Trinity is beautifully depicted in this woodcut from 1511 by renowned Lutheran artist Albrect Dürer. God the Father receives the sacrifice of God the Son (Ephesians 5:2), while God the Holy Spirit hovers over the scene as He did at creation (Genesis 1:2).

If your answer is yes, you have fallen prev to a tactic the devil has used since the Fall in the Garden of Eden. The devil, the best counterfeiter in history. plays upon the attributes of God and places them upon another, even himself. Ironically, the situation above is not foreign to the Scripture, for Elijah is that missionary who found himself in a strikingly similar situation in 1 Kings 18:20-40. The Jewish people had fallen into idolatry, specifically Baal worship. Although Baal worship differed regionally, Elijah came across the form of Baal worship which believed that Baal is the son of EI, the most high god. Baal was once dead, but like the fall harvest,

has come back to life. Baal required a blood sacrifice for appeasement to EI, albeit the sacrifice is not of Baal himself but of a first-born son of each family. Baal was all-powerful and could be seen in miracles such as raining down fire. Yet, Baal was not mistaken as Jehovah. Elijah rhetorically asks the Israelites who are worshipping a false god, "How long will you falter between two opinions? If the Lord is God follow him; but if Baal, follow him" (1 Kings 18:21).

Today, similar debate has revolved around the two largest faiths in the world, Islam and Christianity, and whether the god of the Koran is the God of the Bible. Simply put, the god of Muhammad is not the Father of Jesus. The subject in its essence is not a linguistic issue, but a theological matter with eternal ramifications. To say that since Allah is Arabic for God and YHWH is Hebrew for God, Christians and Muslims worship the same God is beyond naïve—it is blasphemous.

When Elijah challenged his fellow Jews to follow the one

true God, he did so without regard to linguistics. Indeed, the etymology of Baal is derived from the root word for Lord or Master. If the matter at hand were merely about words and similar nomenclature, Elijah's statement would make absolutely no sense. Would the Israelites not be worshipping the same God as their forefathers since they have a title similar to that of their forefathers? Would Elijah not owe an unqualified apology to the prophets of Baal for assuming their worship was a façade and their god nonexistent? How could there even be such a theological animal as a "false god" if the word "god" is used in conversation? And for those who argue linguistically, would they be comfortable praying to Baal today since it is only another word for Lord?

As someone who came out of a Sunni Muslim background, I can personally attest that I rejected God as Father (Surah 5:18), Jesus Christ as the Son of God (Surah 5:116; 19:88), and the very person of the Holy Spirit (Surah 70:4). What part of the Triune God did I understand? I was an idolater, plain and simple, and the vacuity in my prayers only proved that point. Like the Israelites who worshipped Baal, I know too well the great pain of praying to a nonexistent god. As 1 Kings 18:29 describes, "There was no voice; no one answered, no one paid attention." To argue, then, that I was worshipping the true God, just

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inadequately or incompletely, would have been to place false light upon my total darkness. My Muslim mind would have interpreted such folly as insisting that Muhammad did receive at least some of his revelation from the one, true God—that in some ways he was a true prophet.

As someone who came out of a Muslim background, I can personally attest that I rejected God as Father, Jesus Christ as the Son of God, and the very person of the Holy Spirit. What part of the Triune God did I understand? I was an idolater, plain and simple.

This is not an argument which denies that God is sovereign over Muhammad and all followers of Islam. But as Timothy George noted in a recent Christianity Today article, "No devout Muslim can call the God of Muhammad 'Father.' for this, to their mind, would compromise divine transcendence. But no faithful Christian can refuse to confess, with joy and confidence, 'I believe in God the Father ... Almighty!' Apart from the Incarnation and the Trinity, it is possible to know that God is, but not who God is." Even modern Muslim apologists recognize the difficulty in arguing that Christians worship the same god as Muslims. In a recent editorial in the PakTribune (Pakistan News Service). Ahmer Muzammil asserted, "I believe that whoever believes in one Allah (God) without any partners, sons, daughters or incarnations, whether they are Christians, Jews, Muslims, or whoever they might be, they all believe in the same Allah (GOD) that we do and that Jesus, Moses, Adam, Noah, and Mohammad called masses to the same GOD."

The latter part of the quote, attributing Islamic devotion to Old Testament prophets, is key to understanding why the Koran states, "We believe in the revelation which has come down to us and in that which came down to you; Our God and your God is

one; and it is to Him we bow (in Islam)" (Surah 29:46). Muslims do not believe the God of the Old Testament, especially as seen in the Major and Minor Prophets, is their god since the Old Testament is a corrupted collection (Surah 3:78) which fails to clarify that Abraham, Moses, and the other prophets were actually Muslims. Islam, in denying the revelation, denies the Revelator.

The Koran further substantiates the claim that Christians do not worship the same god as Muslims. Surah 5:72 denounces partnering "other gods with Allah," and warns those who do so, "Allah will forbid him the Garden, and the Fire will be his abode." Surah 112:3, perhaps the central passage in the entire discussion, explicitly divorces Allah from the Christian God, explaining, "He begets not, nor is He begotten; and there is none like unto Him." Ultimately, Allah "forgives not (the sin of) joining other gods with Him" (Surah 4:116).

It is clear, then, that according to Islam Peter committed this heinous sin when he publicly proclaimed, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God" (Matthew 16:16). The church itself is built upon this confession of faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, indeed, in the very character of Jesus Christ as the Son of God. To remove Him from the Godhead would be the death knell of the church, the end of Christianity. "There is no other foundation that anyone can lay than that which is laid, which is Jesus Christ" (1 Corinthians 3:11). Rejecting each person of the Trinity, the God of the Old Testament and New Testament is replaced by a figment of Muhammad's imagination, a god that beyond the somewhat similar characteristics of monotheism and transcendence resembles only remotely the God of the Scriptures.

It behooves us as Christians to stand unwaveringly against the ecumenists and syncretists who try to convince us that Muslims and Christians worship the same God. When errant teachers like Charles Kimball state, "The name for God in Islam, in Arabic, is Allah. This is not another god. This is the God. It's the same God that Jews and Christians are talking about," we must ardently stand against such theological heresy. For the

sake of ensuring that the Gospel is preached faithfully and biblically, it is imperative that Christians stand united on this crucial and non-negotiable issue. While Kimball and others are creating confusion with a corrupt notion of the One True God, we must draw a line of separation from them by boldly affirming that He is Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and rejecting the grave theological error that others are promoting.

Since an assent of the god of Islam is ultimately a rejection of the Triune God, any such person who holds to such aberrant views should have the integrity to resign from any position of leadership held within the Church. To equate the god of Islam with the God of the Bible is to reject the God of the Scriptures.

Evidence strongly suggests that the vast majority of Christians uphold the distinction between the god of Islam and the God of the Scripture. In a recent survey, it was stated that 79% of evangelicals do not believe Muslims and Christians worship the same God.

Let's reassure the faithful that what they believe is not in vain, that without Christ, religions and their gods are false. Our voices must be heard on the issue or else our zeal for the lost will diminish and the clarity of the Gospel will be muddled. I pray our response to the situation will be vastly different from that of the Israelites who, when confronted with this issue, "answered [Elijah] not a word" (1 Kings 18:21b). This hour must be one of courage and not cowardice, for if the doctrine of God is compromised, other crucial doctrines will soon fall to the ecumenists as well. Truth is immortal.



#### Midweek Vespers Begins in September

The Voters Assembly at the Quarterly Business Meeting on July 27 approved a proposal by the Board of Elders to begin a regular weekly Midweek Vespers service, starting on September 3.

Midweek Vespers will follow the customary schedule of Advent and Lent services and be held on Wednesdays from 7:00pm-7:30pm. Midweek School classes for the 5th-8th Grades will be held before the service, from 6:15pm-7:00pm, and our new Midweek Bible Study will be held after the service, from 7:30pm-8:30pm.

Adding an additional weekly service is a step forward in the development of our congregation and has been requested by a number of members. We previously had Wednesday evening services about 25% of the year, during Advent and Lent. Expanding this worship opportunity to every week will give members the option of an additional weekly worship time, both for those who want an extra spiritual lift during the week, and for those who may not be able to attend on Sunday.

Midweek Vespers will be about a half-hour long and will not include Holy Communion. We will use various orders of service from *Lutheran Service Book*, including Vespers (Page 229ff), Compline (Page 253ff), and the Service of Prayer and Preaching (Page 260ff). During Advent and Lent, Midweek Vespers will have special themes related to those seasons.



#### Midweek Study on "How to Study the Bible" Begins September 3

Several members have requested a Bible study opportunity in addition to Adult Bible Class on Sunday mornings. In September we will begin a new Midweek Bible Study on Wednesday evenings.

This is part of our new Wednesday evening schedule, with *Midweek School* classes for the 5th-8th Grades from 6:15pm-7:00pm, *Midweek Vespers* from 7:00pm-7:30pm, and *Midweek Bible Study* from 7:30pm-8:30pm.

Our first topic will be *How to Study the Bible*. This study from Northwestern Publishing House introduces a basic method for meditating on Scripture used by Martin Luther—a combination of Bible readings and prayer.

The study includes the following topcis:

Why Should I Study the Bible?

What It Means to Meditate on Scripture

How to Create Your Own Daily Bible Reading Plan

Following this initial study future topics will be suggested by the study participants. Join in Wednesdays at 7:30pm for Midweek Bible Study!






#### Memorial Book Being Compiled

## Thanksgiving for Conversion

O Gracious God, I give thanks to You that You converted my hardened heart, which did not know how to repent, and that You removed my heart of stone and gave me a heart of flesh (Ezekiel 36:26). I had the power to fall into sin and guilt. I did not have the power to rise to repentance. By my own power, I was able to go astray. I was able to return to the right path only by Your power. Just as one who is born crippled cannot be restored with natural remedies but only by divine power, so my soul was born spiritually curved toward sin and earthly

things. No human power could correct it. Only Your grace was able to restore my soul so it loved You and desired Your heavenly blessings. I had the power to deform myself by various sins. You alone were able to reform me. Just as an Ethiopian cannot change his skin or the leopard its spots (Jeremiah 13:23), so I was not able to do good because I was fully devoted to doing evil.

You, my God, converted me, and I am converted (Jeremiah 31:18). After I was converted by You, I repented. After I came to understand, I struck my breast (Jeremiah 31:19). I was dead in sin. and You made me alive. I was able to contribute as much to my conversion as a dead person is able to contribute to his resurrection (John 6:44: John 11:43). If You had not drawn me, I would never have come to You. If You had not awakened me. I would never have watched for You. If You had not enlightened me, I would never have seen You. Sins were sweeter to me than honey and honeycomb. That they are now pungent and bitter, I owe to You, the one who gave me my spiritual taste. Virtuous works were more bitter to me than gall and aloe. That they are now pleasing and delightful, I owe only to You, the one who changed my corrupt fleshly judgment by the Spirit. I went astray as a sheep that was lost (Isaiah 53:6); I turned to the way of iniquity. But You, Good Shepherd, sought me and led me back to the flock of the saints.

Only recently have I recognized You, the true light, because there were great, dark clouds before my vain eyes that prevented me from seeing the light of truth. Recently, I have recognized You, the true light, because I was blind and loved blindness and walked through the darkness of sin toward the darkness of hell. But You, my illuminator, sought the one who was not seeking You. You called the one who was not calling to You. You converted the one who was not converted to You. With a voice full of power, You said, "Let there be light in the inner parts of this heart," and there was light. I saw Your light and recognized my blindness. For that immeasurable kindness, I will praise Your name forever.

estimated value was \$6 million. 'I think phase one is probably closer to \$10 million, but I haven't looked at the numbers recently,' [the pastor] said. 'With change orders, I'm not sure where we've landed.'"

That astonishing statement—their building took four years to construct, went 65% over budget, and they're still not sure how much it cost!—highlights what a wonderful job our own Building Committee did for our congregation. Also, this other church's new sanctuary is very banal and of a flimsy type of construction, which makes our top-quality facility with its interesting and inspiring design seem like a miracle for \$1.5 million!
