

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

On July 4th, 1776, a bell in Philadelphia's Independence Hall rang out the news of our nation's Declaration of Independence. But, actually, that is not why it's called the Liberty Bell. You may not know the real reason it is called the Liberty Bell is because of a Bible verse which is inscribed upon it: *"Proclaim liberty throughout the land unto all the inhabitants thereof"* (Leviticus 25:10).

July 4th falls on a Sunday this year, and we will observe this holiday with a special community service at Prairie Park in Dakota Dunes at 10:00am, in place of our regular service at the church. (The Saturday Summer Service will still be held at the church at 5:30pm on July 3rd.)

The July 4th holiday means much more than just parades, family gatherings, barbecues and fireworks. It is a celebration of the God-given freedom and liberty that we have been blessed with in our nation. As citizens of the United States and as Christians, we have been blessed with two kinds of freedom: *political* freedom in our nation, and *spiritual* freedom through our Savior.

In the National Archives at Washington, D.C. you can view the Declaration of Independence and the two other important documents our early government adopted to insure freedom and liberty in our land, the Constitution and its first ten amendments, known as the "Bill of Rights." The first of the Constitution's amendments is very unique among the laws of the nations, and it is especially important and appropriate for us as Christians. Because, the very first right, the very first freedom you are

guaranteed as an American is: *"Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof."* By the grace of God, we are blessed to live in a country where the government promises not to interfere with our spiritual beliefs, or our right, as Jesus says, to *"worship Him in spirit and in truth"* (John 4:24).

Many years ago a Missouri Synod missionary was stationed in a foreign country where it was unexpectedly announced one New Year's Day that beginning immediately all gatherings for Christian worship were forbidden. When the missionary heard that news on the radio, he wondered what would happen. For, that very day he was scheduled to have a New Year's Communion service in his apartment for the members of his

flock. Would they still come? At the appointed time there was a hesitant knock on the door, and then another and another, as the congregation gathered. They were right in the middle of their communion service when there was a loud banging on the door and demands that it be opened. They all sat quietly and said nothing. After a few minutes the banging stopped, they heard footsteps marching away down the hall, and they continued their communion service. But, that was the last service that missionary would conduct there. For he was soon captured by the secret police and thrown out of the country.

That true story helps us appreciate the first and greatest political freedom we are blessed with in our nation, freedom of religion, freedom of worship. And, why is it that we gather together for worship? What is it we are celebrating, not only at our special service in Prairie Park on July 4th, but as we worship every week? We use the *political* freedom we have to worship to celebrate the *spiritual* freedom that is ours through our Savior.

In ancient Israel every 50 years a Year of Jubilee was observed, a very unique, year-long holiday. The Bible verse that is on the Liberty Bell originally proclaimed this special year: *"Proclaim liberty throughout the land unto all the inhabitants thereof."* During the Year of Jubilee all debts were cancelled, all slaves were set free, and all property reverted to its original owners.

The Year of Jubilee was a living prophecy in the history of Israel, pointing forward to a future time when all spiritual debts would be cancelled, when we would be set free from slavery to sin, when we would be returned to our rightful owner, the Lord our God.

At the beginning of His ministry Jesus announced the fulfillment of that prophecy and the arrival of the

never-ending, spiritual jubilee: *“The Spirit of the Lord is on Me, because He has anointed Me to preach Good News to the poor. He has sent Me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to release the oppressed, to proclaim the year of the Lord’s favor”* (Luke 4:18-19).

Scripture tells us that because of our sinfulness we have all lost our spiritual freedom and we are by nature in bondage to Satan, and the slaves of sin. This means every one of us, as Paul says in Galatians 3:22, *“The Scripture declares that the whole world is a prisoner of sin.”*

But, through the sacrifice of His life, death and resurrection, God’s Son Jesus Christ earned for the world a spiritual “Declaration of Independence” from sin, death and the Devil. As Hebrews 2:14-15 says, *“By His death He destroyed him who holds the power of death—that is, the Devil—and freed those who all their lives were held in slavery by their fear of*

death.” And as Paul says in Romans 6:22, *“Now you have been set free from sin and have become slaves to God.”*

God has declared for the whole world a spiritual “Bill of Rights,” the right to be His children, to come to Him and call upon Him as our heavenly Father, and the right to enter eternal life. As Paul says in Galatians 4:4-5, *“God sent His Son . . . to redeem those under law, that we might receive the full rights of sons.”* In Romans 8:21 Paul describes our spiritual freedom in Christ as, *“The glorious freedom of the children of God.”*

“Proclaim liberty throughout the land unto all the inhabitants thereof.” So, as we worship and celebrate on July 4th, we are celebrating the two kinds of freedom with which we have been blessed: *political* freedom in our nation, and *spiritual* freedom through our Savior.




VBS Mission Project

To go with our “Bee-Lievers in Christ” theme, the children’s offerings from this year’s VBS were designated to buy hives of bees for needy persons overseas through the mission organization Heifer Project International (www.heifer.org).

The honey which bees produce is an important source of nutrition—and a sweet treat too! Those receiving the hives are taught bee husbandry, with a goal of helping make them self-sufficient. Hives are \$30 each and through the children’s generous offerings we were able to donate 13 hives!

Pastor Vogts at LCMS Convention July 8-16

Our church body, The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, holds a national convention every three years. The theme for this year's convention is, "One People—Forgiven."

Convention business includes election of national officers and board members. Sioux City native Rev. Matthew Harrison, an alumnus of East High School and Morningside College, who is currently Executive Director of LCMS World Relief and Human Care, received the most congregational nominations for Synodical President, and our own Jon Dorr is a candidate for the Board of Pastoral Education.

To represent the the 2.5 million members and over 6,000 congregations of the LCMS nationwide, approximately 1,200 voting delegates, evenly divided between laity and clergy, are elected at the circuit level by pastoral and lay representatives from each congregation. Our congregation is part of the Yankton Circuit, and our circuit's voting delegates are Rev. Daniel Redhage of Centerville and Mr. Ervin Brandt of Avon.

In addition to the voting delegates there are a number of advisory delegates, including representatives from all Synodical boards. Pastor Vogts is concluding a six-year term as vice-chairman of the LCMS Board for Communications Services, and he is serving as the board's advisory delegate. He will be at the convention in Houston from July 8-16.


Both services will be held as usual at the regular time. There will not be Adult Bible Class on July 11.

Following the service there will be a reception for the New Members during fellowship time, after which everyone is encouraged to stay for our quarterly business meeting.



Saved by Grace in Cambodia

Rev. Dr. Fungchatou Lo is LCMS missionary in Cambodia, along with his

wife Kalia and daughter Gaozong. Fungchatou and Kalia were both born in Laos and emigrated to the United States as children. Prior to entering the pastoral ministry, Fungchatou earned undergraduate and graduate degrees in social work at the University of Wisconsin, culminating in a doctorate in urban studies. Kalia also has undergraduate and graduate degrees from the University of Wisconsin in health education. Their teenage daughter Gaozong was born in the United States.

Pastor Lo was recently privileged to baptize a very sick ten-year-old Cambodian girl named Mei, from Sihanouk province. Mei was suffering from an extremely large, untreated tumor in her stomach, which caused her abdomen to be painfully distended.

At the time Dr. Fred Kiehl, part of a team of medical professionals working

with Global Health Mission and a member of Peace Lutheran Church in Cameron, Missouri, was visiting the Lo family in Phnom Phen. After seeing photos of the girl, Dr. Kiehl decided he would like to see her, and Mei and her parents journeyed to Phnom Phen to meet with him.

After examining the girl and reviewing test results from her Cambodian doctor, Dr. Kiehl told Rev. Lo, "I believe what the girl needs now is not Dr. Kiehl, but Dr. Fungchatou. I can't do anything for her, but you can minister to her."

Pastor Lo sat with the parents and talked with them about God's love and assured them that, while medical doctors may not be able to save Mei, God can save her and give her eternal life. After he finished sharing with the parents, they had Mei baptized right there in the hotel room. In Baptism, Mei received new life as a child of God and all of the blessings of Christ's atoning sacrifice.

It was only several months later that Mei's suffering was ended and she was called to her heavenly home. Mei's parents were saddened, but comforted that she was now at peace and finally, fully healed of her traumatic illness.

The entire village came out for Mei's funeral conducted by Pastor Lo, and the Gospel message of hope which he presented—virtually unknown in Cambodia—had a profound impact on those in attendance. As a final testimony to her trusting faith Mei was buried in something quite unique in Cambodia: a coffin emblazoned with a Christian cross.

Please pray for Mei's parents as they continue to mourn her death, that they may be comforted by the promise of eternal life in Christ for their dear daughter.

Pray also for the Lo family as they serve the people of Cambodia. Ask God to protect them, keep them faithful, give them strength, and bless their labors with continued success in this country where so few know of Christ. Thank God that the Lo family has answered His call to spread the Good News in Cambodia!

also listed historic commemorations of some of our forbearers in the faith. The following brief descriptions of the significance of the commemorations this month are from the *Treasury of Daily Prayer*.

**St. Mary Magdalene
(July 22)**

Whenever the New Testament Gospels name the women who were with Jesus, St. Mary Magdalene is listed first (John 19:25 is the only exception), perhaps because she was the first to see the risen Savior alive. Luke 8:2 reports that Jesus had cured her of being possessed by seven demons.

Through the centuries, she has often been identified with the repentant "woman of the city" who anointed Jesus' feet as He sat at the table in the Pharisee's home (Luke 7:36-50). But there is no biblical basis for this identification of her with a penitent prostitute. Nor is she to be identified with Mary, the sister of Martha, in Bethany.

According to the Gospels, Mary Magdalene saw Jesus die; she witnessed

His burial; and, most important, she was the first to see Him alive again after His resurrection (John 20:11-18). It is for good reason that Bernard of Clairvaux calls her "the apostle to the apostles."

**St. James the Elder, Apostle
(July 25)**

St. James and his brother John, sons of Zebedee and Salome (see Matthew 27:56 and Mark 15:40), were fishermen in the Sea of Galilee who were called with Peter and his brother Andrew to follow Jesus (Matthew 4:18-22).

In the Gospel lists of Jesus' disciples, James is listed following Peter and preceding John. Together, these three appear as leaders of the Twelve. Because James precedes John, it is reasoned that James is the elder of the brothers.

The Book of Acts records that James was beheaded by Herod Agrippa I, probably between AD 42 and 44 (Acts 12:1-2). Thus James is the first of the Twelve to die a martyr.


